### Available Certifications:

#### **Medical Science Technology/EMT**

Medical Science students have the opportunity to earn many certifications that will make them more employable in the workforce or give them experience in achieving higher education. Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA) with this certification they will immediately be able to go to work in a nursing home. They may choose a path in Emergency Medicine and want to earn the Emergency Medical Responder and Emergency Medical Technician. Some students may even choose to earn a Phlebotomy Certification to work in a medical lab. Students will also earn CPR and Basic First Aid as well.
